



Baltimore County Police Accountability Board

Mission: In the Spring of 2022 Baltimore County began the process to establish a Police Accountability Board (PAB), as required by HB0670, the Maryland Police Accountability Act of 2021—Police Discipline and Law Enforcement Programs and Procedures. Pursuant to this law, each county must have a PAB to:

- Hold quarterly meetings with heads of law enforcement agencies, and otherwise work with law enforcement agencies and the County government to improve matters of policing
- Appoint civilian members to charging committees and trial boards
- Receive complaints of law enforcement misconduct filed by members of the public
- On a quarterly basis, review outcomes of disciplinary matters considered by charging committees
- By December 31 each year, submit a report to the governing body of the County that identifies any trends in the disciplinary process of County law enforcement officers, and makes recommendations on changes to policy that would improve law enforcement accountability in the County

Complaints: The duties of the PAB includes receiving complaints of law enforcement misconduct filed by members of the public. Law enforcement misconduct can be reported to the PAB using this link: <https://www.baltimorecountymd.gov/boards-commissions/executive/PAB/report-misconduct>
